Enterprise High School

Enterprise High School is the alternative high school completion program in our district, serving students between the ages of 16 and 19 years of age. Core academic classes are offered that satisfy requirements for graduation in the Warren Woods School District and meet the objectives of the Michigan Merit Curriculum. Online credit recovery classes are available, and dual enrollment opportunities are an option, provided students meet the Warren Woods Public School guidelines.

ASBESTOS HAZARD EMERGENCY

RESPONSE ACT (AHERA)

2014 NOTIFICATION

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires that each year, district workers and building occupants receive notification about asbestos activities such as response actions and inspections. The purpose of this correspondence is to meet those requirements and familiarize you with the asbestos related activities that have been conducted in Warren Woods Public Schools during the past year.

MANAGEMENT PLANS

In 1988, Warren Wood Public Schools contracted with an environmental consulting firm to conduct inspections and develop asbestos Management Plans for asbestos containing material (ACM) within all district owned buildings. These Management Plans are located in the administrative office of each building and are available to the public for review. A copy of each building management plan is also located at the Maintenance Building.

SURVEILLANCE ACTIVITIES

The AHERA regulation requires periodic surveillance of the condition of ACM every six months. Warren Woods Public Schools will conduct the next periodic surveillance in January 2015. The regulation also requires reinspections conducted every three years by Michigan Accredited Inspectors. Warren Woods Public Schools contracted an independent consulting firm, to conduct the reinspections. The reinspection was completed in July 2013. Previous reinspections and six month periodic inspections are located in the building's Management Plans.

ASBESTOS ABATEMENT

Warren Woods Public Schools performed minor asbestos abatement relating to operations and maintenance projects in 2014 including a very small amount of floor tile removal at Briarwood Elementary School. It should be noted that, when asbestos abatement is conducted, Warren Woods Public Schools hires a Michigan Licensed Asbestos Abatement Contractor to perform the removal activities and an Environmental Consulting Firm to conduct air sampling during and after the assigned removal in compliance with all applicable regulatory standards.

Pesticide Control Act

ADVISORY TO ALL PARENTS

Warren Woods Public Schools has adopted an Integrated Pest Management program (IPM). The district makes every effort to reduce pesticide use as much as possible. While it may occasionally be necessary to apply a pesticide, these will only be used as a last resort. This program does not rely on routine pesticide applications to resolve problems. We use various techniques such as habitat alteration, sanitation, mechanical means, exclusion, etc. to prevent pests from becoming a problem.

You will receive advance notice of the application of a pesticide, other than bait or gel formulations, at your child's school. This advance notice of the application will be given 48 hours prior. Notices will be placed at the main entrance door and at the main office. Parents are also entitled to receive this notice by e-mailing pesticidenotification@waw.misd.net. Provide your name, address and what school your child attends.

In an emergency (for example, bees nest), pesticides may be applied without prior notice, but you will be provided notice following any such application.

This number or e-mail may also be used when school is not in regular session.

Adult & Community Education

Warren Woods Adult & Community Education proudly provides opportunities for many individuals in the community who wish to earn a high school diploma, improve English skills, or participate in an enrichment class.

The High School Completion program, accredited by AdvancedED, offers day and evening classes for adult learners who wish to earn a high school diploma and achieve high school graduation. Students must be 18 years of age on September 1st to enroll, but we believe you are never too old to earn your high school diploma. Students must also be Macomb County residents. Students from Warren Woods Tower High School may take advantage of the Credit Recovery program offered Monday through Thursday evenings to make up previously unearned credits.

English As a Second Language (ESL) provides year-round instruction to members of the community for whom English is not a primary language. Students improve reading, writing, listening, and speaking skills while also learning about citizenship, computers, job-seeking, and many other everyday skills.

Beginning in 2013, Adult Basic Education (ABE) will provide valuable literacy improvement to community members who qualify. While foundational classes help our adult students aged 20 and older gain the skills necessary to earn a high school diploma, other adults in the community who have already earned a diploma but lack basic skills may be eligible for this program. ABE classes are also ideal for those seeking to prepare for the GED test and GED prep classes.

Senior citizens enjoy their weekly Game Day every Tuesday from noon until 3 PM. Local seniors gather to play pinochle, euchre, and other card and board games. Refreshments are provided, and there is no cost to participate.

Open to the rest of the community are enrichment classes such as Segment I and II driver training, yoga, cheerleading, line dancing, and dog training. A full listing can be found on the Warren Woods Adult & Community Education website.

Required Childhood Immunizations for Michigan School Settings

School communicable disease rules are the minimum standard for preventing disease outbreaks in school settings. To best protect patients from all diseases we have the power to prevent, healthcare providers in Michigan should follow the 2014 Recommended Immunization Schedule at www.cdc.gov/vaccines or www.michigan.gov/immunize.

****All doses of vaccines must be given with appropriate spacing between doses and at appropriate ages to be considered valid.****

Free or Reduced Meal Family Application

An annual meal application for free and reduced priced meals must be completed each school year. Each family will only need to COMPLETE ONE FORM.

If your child received a free or reduced price meal last school year he/she will receive the same benefit through Monday, October 13th, OR until you receive written notification changing their status.

Completing your free and reduced lunch application online speeds up the processing time. The application can be found online at www.lunchapp.com or there is a link on the District website at www.warrenwoods.misd.net, on the Food Service Department page.

Family applications will be sent through the U.S. Mail at the beginning of the school year. Applications will also be available at school offices and the Administrative Service Center at 12900 Frazho Road, Warren, MI 48089.



Prepaid Meal Program

Students have the following options when making purchases:

Students can pay cashier each day,

Students can pre-pay to cashier by cash or check (made payable to Warren Woods Food Service). Students can pre-pay for breakfast, lunch, and A-la-carte purchases.

Upon approval, the site will allow credit card deposits to be made into the child's account for purchases in the school meals program. Account activity, including the child's seven-day purchase history, is also accessible at this website. There is no fee or charge to set up an account and monitor your child's balance.




2014-2015 Bus Stops Schedule

The Warren Woods Transportation Department has automated our school bus stop schedule system. To determine your child's stop go to the Warren Woods Public Schools website at <http://www.warrenwoods.misd.net> and: **1.** click OUR DISTRICT **2.** click DEPARTMENT **3.** click TRANSPORTATION **4.** click on the school bus icon shown above. You will be redirected to WebQuery which is linked to our bus routing program. Once there, select your child's school from the dropdown menu, select their grade and enter your address number and street. Only students who live further than 1.5 miles from the school or in pre-determined hazard areas are eligible for transportation. Schools of Choice students are **not** eligible. If your child is eligible, the approximate stop time, stop location and bus number will be displayed for both morning and afternoon transportation. Please note that many of the stop locations change each year to maximize student safety, so check WebQuery prior to the start of the school year. Contact the Transportation Department at 586.439.4975 with any questions.

Kindergarten Transportation

Kindergarteners ride the same buses with 1st grade through 5th grade elementary students. To determine if your child is eligible for transportation, or to find their stop location and bus number, please follow the directions in the School Bus Stop Schedule article.

It is important that your kindergartener understands the bus safety guidelines. As a parent, you are your child's most influential teacher, so we are asking you to explain the following guidelines to them:

- 1. Be ready for the bus at the scheduled time.** Bus times vary due to road conditions and traffic, so we ask that you have your child at the bus stop approximately 10 minutes before the scheduled arrival time each day. Bus riders who are late to stops often don't act safely.
- 2. Wait until the bus is stopped before moving toward it and getting on.** Often students get anxious as the bus arrives, and run forward while the bus is still moving. This is dangerous because a student could slip or fall in front of the moving bus.
- 3. After getting on the bus, go to a seat, sit down and stay seated.** Students are not permitted to stand up while the bus is moving. Doing so could cause injury.
- 4. Remain quiet on the bus, so you don't distract the driver.** Children like to talk to their friends on the bus. This is OK unless it gets too loud. When the bus is too loud the driver can't hear important things like train whistles, sirens or communications on the two-way radios.
- 5. Do what the driver tells you to do.** The driver is in charge of the bus, and is trying to keep everyone safe. Sometimes they will have to tell students to be quiet, sit down or wait to get on or off of the bus.

6. Make sure you get on the right bus. Each bus has a character sign that will be placed in the window or on the side of the bus near the door. If a different bus is used the character sign will be moved, so that your child can recognize it. Give your child a card to carry around the first week of school that has their bus number, bus stop location and window character in case they get confused.

7. Be ready to get off the bus when it gets near your stop, but don't get up until the bus stops moving.

Many times young students get involved in conversations with their friends and forget to watch for their stop. When they arrive they aren't ready to pick up their backpack and get off the bus or the bus passes their stop. If the kindergartener misses their stop the bus has to go back, making the bus late to all the other stops.

8. After getting off of the bus, walk away from the bus and don't stay near it. If your child has to cross the street have them make eye contact with the driver and WAIT until the driver waves them across. Make sure they take at least 5 big steps out from the front of the bus, so the driver can see them over the hood of the vehicle.

9. Never go back to the bus after you get off even if you dropped something. Wait until the bus is gone, and then get your mom or dad to go with you to get it. According to bus statistics, this is when most student accidents occur. Tell your child that if they forgot something on the bus, you can take them to the bus garage and get it, or call the bus garage and have the driver bring it to your child the following day.

10. The Warren Woods Transportation Department takes pride in transporting your children to school safely and timely. We hope that with your help and guidance your child will understand the basics of bus safety and look forward to riding the bus to school.

WWPS Early Childhood and Elementary School Summer School Programs

Warren Woods Public Schools has been proud to offer various programs to our students over the summer. Most of our summer elementary programs were held at Westwood Elementary School and students received free breakfast and lunch on a daily basis. Here is a brief summary of each of the programs:



Title I Summer School

This five-week enrichment program was designed to help K - 5 students improve their literacy and mathematics skills. Students were immersed with literature and math throughout the program. The program was held at Westwood Elementary School.



MISD Kinder Connect

This four-week camp was specific to 16 students entering Kindergarten in the fall. It targeted emergent literacy skills with a focus on reading and writing. The program was held at Westwood Elementary School.



MISD First Fundamentals

This four-week camp was specific to 16 students entering First Grade in the fall. It targeted the students developing literacy skills with a focus on reading and writing. The program was held at Westwood Elementary School.



MISD Science/Literacy Camp

This four-week camp balances hands on science activities with targeted literacy activities. 48 students participated in literacy and science blocks worked in a variety of learning settings: independent, pairs, small group, and whole group. The program was held at Westwood Elementary School.

Title I Preschool Summer Camp

This three-week camp was offered to all three year-olds entering Title I Preschool in the fall. It offered students the opportunity to become familiar with their teachers, classmates, and the learning environment with an increased staff to student ratio. The program was held at the Warren Woods Early Childhood Center.

Jump Start to Kindergarten

Jump Start was offered to any incoming WWPS student entering kindergarten in fall 2014. Instructed by WWPS Preschool and Kindergarten staff, students worked cooperatively on activities to help prepare them for Kindergarten. The program was held at each elementary school.

Southwest Macomb Technical Education Consortium

The Southwest Macomb Technical Education Consortium (SMTEC) is a collaborative commitment between Center Line, Fitzgerald, Van Dyke and Warren Woods Public School Districts to provide a wide array of Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs to their respective students.

Points of Pride

- Over 1500 students enrolled in a CTE course, representing 40% of the total high school population.

Official Discipline Policy

The following legal notices are required to be published by the state and or federal government. The following summary is taken from the official policy of the Board of Education. The full text of the discipline policy is available upon request.

The Board of Education may make reasonable rules and regulations for the behavior of those attending its schools. Misconduct, both at curricular or extracurricular activities, can result in exclusion, suspension, extended suspension or expulsion.

The Board of Education recognizes that exclusion from the educational programs of the district, whether by suspension or expulsion, is the most severe sanction that can be imposed on a student in this district and one that cannot be imposed without due process since exclusion deprives a child of the right to an education. For purposes of this policy "suspension" shall be the short term (not more than ten (10) days) or long-term exclusion of a student from a regular district program.

The principal may impose a suspension of up to a ten (10) day duration, but shall notify the student's parents or guardians of the suspension by telephone or by regular mail and shall send a copy of the notification home with the student and shall include the parental rights to appeal. Suspension of more than one (1) school day but not more than ten (10) school days may be appealed in writing to the principal within two (2) school days of the parents' receipt of the written suspension notice. The written appeal must contain the reason(s) that the suspension is being appealed.

The superintendent or the building administrator may give a student a short-term suspension. The Board designates the superintendent as its representative at any hearings regarding the appeal of a suspension. The superintendent may recommend to the Board a long-term suspension or that a student be expelled. In all cases, due process rights must be observed.

Expulsion shall be the permanent exclusion of a student from the schools of this district. No student below the age of sixteen (16) should be expelled without notification of expulsion being given to the juveniles division of the Probate Court. Any student who brings a weapon to school shall be expelled for at least one (1) year. Upon request, parents of a student being expelled may request a hearing before the Board of Education.

Decisions of the Board of Education may be appealed through the Civil Courts.

Education Records

The education records of any student enrolled in the Warren Woods Public Schools (WWPS) are protected under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974.

A parent or eligible student (one who has attained the age of 18 or is in a post secondary educational institution) may, and is encouraged to review their records. The review may be done by contacting the building principal and arranging an appointment. A member of the staff will accompany the reviewer to provide explanation and interpretation as required.

If the parent or eligible student feels some portion of the record is inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of privacy or other rights of the student, he or she may ask that the record be amended. If satisfaction is not achieved at the building or department level, a hearing will be held on the matter upon request. Following the decision of the hearing officer, if satisfaction is still not achieved, a written explanation may be added to the record of the rationale for challenging that record. Copies of educational records will be provided to parents or eligible students upon request. A charge may be made to cover duplication costs.

No records, files or dates directly relating to an individual student shall be made available to anyone without the consent and notification of the student or the parents or guardian of a student under the age of 18, except:

1. The teachers and officials of this school district who have a legitimate educational interest in such information, or unless
2. There has been a federal request for submission of student records in connection with the student's application for financial aid. The student or parent will be notified if officials of a school to which a student intends to enroll desire access to student records, or if a court has ordered access to such records, parental or student consent is needed.

Non-Discrimination Policy

In compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, the American with Disabilities Act of 1990, and the Elliott-Larsen Civil Rights Act of 1977, it is the policy of the Warren Woods School District that no person (or student) shall, on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin or ancestry, gender/sex, age, disability, height, weight, or marital status be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination during any program or activity or in employment. The following behaviors are not acceptable: staring or leering in a way that seems too personal, spreading sexual gossip, sexual comments, remarks or suggestions, name calling with sexual overtones, any unwanted physical contact of a sexual nature (touching or grabbing), obscene gestures or pressure for sexual activity.

The following behaviors are not allowed: racial slurs, negative remarks or other degrading statements directed toward other students or staff members will not be tolerated and will be disciplined accordingly.

Student Directory Information

Each year the district will provide public notice to students and their parents of its intent to make available, upon request, certain information known as "directory information". The Board designated, as student directory information, a student's name, address, phone number, photograph, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, height and weight, if a member of an athletic team, dates of attendance, date of graduation, awards received, or any other information which would not generally be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy, if disclosed.

Parents and adult students may refuse to allow the district to disclose any or all of such directory information upon written notification to the district within ten (10) days after receipt of the district's public notice. A form for this purpose is available at each building or at the pupil accounting office.

The district may disclose directory information on former students without student or parental consent.

The superintendent shall prepare procedures to ensure that students and parents are adequately informed each year regarding their rights to inspect and review the student's education records.

The principal of each building or the department is charged with the responsibility of maintaining and safeguarding the educational records. Employees of WWPS in the areas of instruction, special services, administration, research / evaluation and student records are authorized to have access to records in the educational interest of the student.

This would include the student's academic, physical, emotional, personal, social and vocational decisions. Any other person except those agencies specified in the Act must have a signed consent of the parent or eligible student to gain access to the educational records and request amendments prior to their being released.

Warren Woods Public Schools Salutes Three Outstanding Teachers

Three Warren Woods Public School teachers were selected to receive the 2014 Outstanding Teacher Award. This recognition program is sponsored by the Macomb Intermediate School District (MISD). Teachers from around Macomb County are eligible for this award.

Warren Woods Public Schools is proud to have three teachers nominated for the 2014 award. The 2014 honorees are: Ann Farrell (Pinewood Elementary Speech and Language Teacher), Mindy Smith (Middle School Special Education Teacher) and Caryn Curcio (Warren Woods Tower English Teacher).

Special Education and Section 504 Child Find Notice

The Warren Woods Public Schools Department of Special Services has the duty to locate, evaluate, and identify any child residing in the District who qualifies for special Education services or Section 504 accommodations or services.

With the passage of the individuals with Disabilities Education Amendments/Revisions of 2007 (IDEA), the Senate and Federal Government continue to assure that all handicapped children (ages 0-25) may receive special education services. The term "children with disabilities" refers to children:

With cognitive impairment, hearing impairments (including deafness) speech or language impairments, visual impairments (including blindness), emotional impairments, physical impairments, autism, traumatic brain injury, other health impairments, or specific learning disabilities, or any combination of these impairments; and who, by reason are in need of special education and/or related services.

In compliance with the IDEA Act, Public Act Amendments/Revisions of 2007, Public Act 451 of 1976 and P.L.94-142 (Education for All Handicapped children) the Macomb Intermediate School District (M.I.S.D.) and all twenty-one (21) school districts have developed a plan, which outlines services for all eligible handicapped children and youth.

The M.I.S.D. plan describes the special education device delivery throughout Macomb County. Children eligible for Section 504 accommodations or services include those children who have a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits a major life activity.

WHAT IS A CONCUSSION?

A **concussion** is a **type of traumatic brain injury** that changes the way the brain normally works. A concussion is caused by a fall, bump, blow, or jolt to the head or body that causes the head and brain to move quickly back and forth. A concussion can be caused by a shaking, spinning or a sudden stopping and starting of the head. Even a "ding," "getting your bell rung," or what seems to be a mild bump or blow to the head can be serious. A concussion can happen even if you haven't been knocked out.

You can't see a concussion. Signs and symptoms of concussions can show up right after the injury or may not appear or be noticed until days or weeks after the injury. If the student reports any symptoms of a concussion, or if you notice symptoms yourself, seek medical attention right away. A student who may have had a concussion should not return to play on the day of the injury and until a health care professional says they are okay to return to play.

IF YOU SUSPECT A CONCUSSION:

- SEEK MEDICAL ATTENTION RIGHT AWAY** - A health care professional will be able to decide how serious the concussion is and when it is safe for the student to return to regular activities, including sports. Don't hide it, report it. Ignoring symptoms and trying to "tough it out" often makes it worse.
- KEEP YOUR STUDENT OUT OF PLAY** - Concussions take time to heal. Don't let the student return to play the day of injury and until a health care professional says it's okay. A student who returns to play too soon, while the brain is still healing, risks a greater chance of having a second concussion. Young children and teens are more likely to get a concussion and take longer to recover than adults. Repeat or second concussions increase the time it takes to recover and can be very serious. They can cause permanent brain damage, affecting the student for a lifetime. They can be fatal. It is better to miss one game than the whole season.
- TELL THE SCHOOL ABOUT ANY PREVIOUS CONCUSSION** - Schools should know if a student had a previous concussion. A student's school may not know about a concussion received in another sport or activity unless you notify them.

SIGNS OBSERVED BY PARENTS:

Appears dazed or stunned	Can't recall events prior to or after a hit or fall	Answers questions slowly
Is confused about assignment or position	Is unsure of game, score, or opponent	Loses consciousness (even briefly)
Forgets an instruction	Moves clumsily	Shows mood, behavior, or personality changes

CONCUSSION DANGER SIGNS:

In rare cases, a dangerous blood clot may form on the brain in a person with a concussion and crowd the brain against the skull. A student should receive immediate medical attention if after a bump, blow, or jolt to the head or body s/he exhibits any of the following danger signs:

One pupil larger than the other	Repeated vomiting or nausea	Becomes increasingly confused, restless or agitated
Is drowsy or cannot be awakened	Slurred speech	Has unusual behavior
A headache that gets worse	Convulsions or seizures	Loses consciousness (even a brief loss of consciousness should be taken seriously.)
Weakness, numbness, or decreased coordination	Cannot recognize people/places	

HOW TO RESPOND TO A REPORT OF A CONCUSSION:

If a student reports one or more symptoms of a concussion after a bump, blow, or jolt to the head or body, s/he should be kept out of athletic play the day of the injury. The student should only return to play with permission from a health care professional experienced in evaluating for concussion. During recovery, rest is key. Exercising or activities that involve a lot of concentration (such as studying, working on the computer, or playing video games) may cause concussion symptoms to reappear or get worse. Students who return to school after a concussion may need to spend fewer hours at school, take rests breaks, be given extra help and time, spend less time reading, writing or on a computer. After a concussion, returning to sports and school is a gradual process that should be monitored by a health care professional.

Remember: Concussion affects people differently. While most students with a concussion recover quickly and fully, some will have symptoms that last for days, or even weeks. A more serious concussion can last for months or longer.


